Co-operation in a Fragmented World

"**Co-operation in a Fragmented World**" was the headline for the global economic summit in Davos last week (16-20 January), which marked the first in-person meeting since the COVID-pandemic crisis. The overall takeaway this year from the annual conference was that the global economic outlook remains bleak; the WEF Chief Economists Outlook forecast that the <u>risk of a global recession is high</u>. The IMF expects around <u>a third of the</u> <u>global economy to enter a recession</u> in 2023, and has cut its forecast of global GDP growth for the year to 2.7%.

Panelists at Davos discussed whether the present time can be characterized by <u>"re-globalization or "de-globalization"</u>, with the nations in attendance contributing their projections for the future economy. <u>WTO Director General Ngozi Okonjo-Iweala</u> underlined that trade could make a substantial contribution to global growth, while <u>US Trade</u>

<u>Representative Katherine Tai</u> pointed to the need for a global shift to a new trading system that aims to promote inclusiveness, resilience and sustainability. Chinese Vice Premier Liu He reiterated China's goal of common prosperity but emphasized that this was by "no means a synonym of egalitarianism or welfarism".

One sign of global tension was the attendance: while the Summit gathered more than 2,700 attendees, world leaders from G7 and G20 countries were mostly absent in stark contrast to previous years, in itself underlining the fragmented world. Participants from Asia included President Marcos of the Philippines, who warned that increasing tensions in the South China Sea were harming trade, and President Yoon Suk-yeol of the Republic of Korea, who vowed to work with other countries to stabilize global supply chains. Much attention was focused on India with growth prospects for the coming years differing positively from most of the world.

While the failure to mitigate and adapt to climate change top the WEF Global Risk Perception Survey (see below) for the coming 10-year period, over the next two years, the cost of living, geoeconomic confrontation, and erosion of social cohesion loom largest in the risk perception.

DASN: Network Meeting in Manila



The Danish-Asian SME Network hosted a peer to peer networking meeting in Manila yesterday with 25 participants. In close cooperation with NordCham Philippines and DASN Advisory Board member Jesper Svenningsen, Danish business people based in the Philippines engaged in productive dialogues, debates and discussions. Among the participants were business people from Denmark and Thailand, and Gert Grønkjær and Lars Siggaard Andersen reported an enthusiastic group, where DASN and its networking methods were well received.

The main takeaways from the Manila meeting were:

1) The need for increased connection to Denmark and recognition of the efforts of Danes based abroad;

2) Danes approaching the business market for the first time should prepare thoroughly and make contact with Danes already established in the region;

3) The Philippines has an extraordinary amount to offer Denmark market-wise and it is one of the easiest markets to operate in Asia. According to the DASN project leaders, there is no other way to put it: the Philippines should be a part of anyone planning to do business in Asia.

For the fourth consecutive year, Asia House and the EAC Foundation are pleased to announce the EAC Bachelor Prize in 2023. The annual prize awards DKK 25,000 to the brightest talents at Copenhagen Business School with a strong interest in Asia, to encourage them to pursue relevant issues and challenges within Asia-Pacific in the areas of trade, business, economics, and entrepreneurship, and to support them in their future endeavours.

The EAC Bachelor Prize is part of the EAC Foundation's Youth Strategy, designed to inspire and create relationships between the next generation of businesspeople in Denmark and Asia, and to communicate awareness of the values for good management, innovation, and entrepreneurship, which the East Asiatic Company (ØK) built on for over 100 years. The EAC Foundation is dedicated to developing, maintaining, and strengthening relations between Denmark and Asia, through projects and activities organized by Asia House.

The Award

One winning thesis will be selected from among four CBS bachelor programmes. The authors of the winning thesis will each receive a cash prize of **25,000 DKK** (max. three authors).

Eligibility for the Award

The Prize competition is open to CBS students writing their bachelor thesis in the spring semester in the programmes of International Business, International Business in Asia, International Shipping and Trade, and HA Almen.

It is expected that the thesis investigate important Asia-Pacific business and economic challenges or opportunities; demonstrate relevance to Asia (by deliberating either Danish business activities in Asia or Danish enterprises seeking to enter an Asian business market); demonstrate relevance for practical application; provide a new angle and insight.
