Interns in Indonesia with the EAC Foundation Scholarship



The EAC Foundation, in collaboration with the Otto Mønsted Foundation, awarded five students a collective scholarship of DKK 25,000 each for their fall internships in Indonesia, fostering educational and professional growth.

Sebastian With was a recipient of the scholarship awarded by the EAC Foundation and the Otto Mønsted Foundation. Currently enrolled at Copenhagen Business School, Sebastian spent the autumn semester of 2023 at A.P. Møller-Maersk's office in Indonesia.

Can you tell about your decision to undertake an internship abroad In Indonesia?



I needed a break from my studies and saw this internship as a fantastic opportunity to translate my theoretical knowledge into practical experience, expand my network, and gain insight into new cultures. My goal was to develop both personally and professionally, which was highly achieved.

How was your experience as an intern at Maersk, and how did it contribute to your professional development?

My experience at Maersk was extremely rewarding and developmental. I had the opportunity to actively participate in investment projects and support various new growth opportunities. This significantly contributed to my professional development by providing practical experience in extensive market research, investment initiatives, and product development.

Can you share some challenges you encountered during the work?

Before my internship, I had no previous experience working in a global organization. As a result, I faced a challenge at the beginning of the internship in achieving effective communication between different teams and navigating the complex structure of the organization. This required in-depth dialogue and adaptability.

What is your advice for students considering participating in similar international internships?

For students considering similar international internships, I would recommend the following:

- 1. Be open to cultural differences and be willing to learn and adapt.
- 2. Focus on communication and responsiveness to different perspectives.

- 3. Be proactive and take responsibility for your tasks and projects.
- 4. Build business and personal relationships and be active in expanding your network.
- 5. Be curious and strive to maximize your learning and understanding of the industry or field you are working in.
