Shifting Balances on a Global Scale

February may be the shortest month, but four weeks' impact on global politics can be profound. This year's Munich Security Conference starkly revealed the widening gap between the United States and Europe in their worldviews, political priorities, and approaches to international law—trends that have accelerated since 20 January with the new U.S. administration.

On 24 February, the somber third anniversary of Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine, all United Nations member states were forced to navigate these shifting geopolitical currents. Some might dismiss the UN as having lost too much power and credibility to matter, given its struggles to fulfill its primary mission of protecting humanity from war, hunger, and mistreatment. Yet such a conclusion would be misguided. At the UN, each government must reveal its true position on the global stage. The Trump administration's decision to side with Russia marked a dramatic departure from American foreign policy since 1945. Similarly, Europe's refusal to align with the U.S. signaled its own significant shift. Asian nations, too, found themselves at a crossroads:

North Korea stood alone among Asian nations in siding with the U.S. and Russia during the General Assembly vote on Ukraine's resolution.

Several countries voted alongside Europe and Ukraine: **Bhutan, Cambodia, Indonesia, Japan, Malaysia, Myanmar, Nepal, Papua New Guinea, Philippines, Republic of Korea, Singapore, Thailand, and Timor-Leste**.

Others chose to abstain: Bangladesh, China, India, Laos, Mongolia, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, and Vietnam.

These voting patterns reflect the complex realignment of global alliances in a rapidly changing international order.

We were honored to have **Christian** Føhrby, Public Affairs Manager at Mærsk Mc-Kinney Møller Center for Zero Carbon Shipping, as our keynote speaker. Christian delivered a nuanced presentation that challenged the audience by giving highly entertaining examples of how little is known in Europe about present-day Asia's cultural icons and highlighted the region's significance and opportunities for young people. Drawing from his experience in diplomacy, sustainability, and business, he shared key insights from his time working and studying across Asia.

Students from the University of Copenhagen also introduced their podcast <u>"Er det ik' Asien?"</u>, sharing their efforts to raise awareness about Asia and why they believe it is important.




Spotlight: Vietnam's Green and Digital Transition

Vietnam's rapid industrialization has led to environmental challenges, including pollution and resource depletion. In response, the country is investing heavily in green technologies, waste management, and sustainable energy solutions. With a plan to invest up to \$1.8 billion in upgrading hospitals and pharmaceutical production, Vietnam also presents strong opportunities for Danish businesses in medical technology and healthcare solutions.

Did you know Thailand is the first Southeast Asian country to legalize samesex marriage?



Thailand has become the first Southeast
Asian country to legalize same-sex marriage.
The new law, which took effect on January 23,
2025, grants same-sex couples the same
legal rights as heterosexual couples, including
inheritance, healthcare, and adoption.

On the first day, over 1,800 couples registered their marriages, marking a historic moment for LGBTQ+ rights in Thailand. The law is seen as a major step toward equality in a country known for its vibrant LGBTQ+ culture.
